Pleasant Ridge, Nevada City Elementary, Gold Run School and Hennessey School

Bell Hill School closed in 2005

Pleasant Valley School will close at the end of this school year.

### **Charter Schools**

#### The Charter Schools Act of 1992 states:

- It is the intent of the Legislature...to provide opportunities for teachers, parents, pupils, and community members to establish and maintain schools that operate independently from the existing school district structure, as a method to accomplish all of the following:
- (a) Improve pupil learning.
- (b) Increase learning opportunities for all pupils, with special emphasis on expanded learning experiences for pupils who are identified as academically low achieving.
- (c) Encourage the use of different and innovative teaching methods.
- (d) Create new professional opportunities for teachers, including the opportunity to be responsible for the learning program at the school site.
- (e) Provide parents and pupils with expanded choices in the types of educational opportunities that are available within the public school system.
- (f) Hold the schools established under this part accountable for meeting measurable pupil outcomes, and provide the schools with a method to change from rule-based to performance-based accountability systems.
- (g) Provide vigorous competition within the public school system to stimulate continual improvements in all public schools.
  Ed. Code §47601(a)-(g).

#### In 2014 Everything Changed.....

- Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF)
  - Governor's proposal to restructure California's complex education funding mechanism
  - Flexibility in Funding / Local Control: Requires a Local Accountability Plan with oversight by the County Office of Education
  - Districts receive a base funding level with add on funding for students who are socioeconomically disadvantaged, foster youth and English Language Learners
  - Attempts to equalize funding across school districts in CA
- Local Control Accountability Plans (LCAP)
  - Three year plans
  - Stakeholder participation required
  - School District plans are approved by the County Superintendent of Schools
  - Charter School plans are approved by charter councils and considered in the renewal process
  - County Office plans are approved by the county board of education
  - Funds generated by low income, foster youth and English language learners must be used for improving services and supports for those pupils

### Current Issues in Education: Changing Demographics in Nevada County Schools

• Some data to consider:

In the last 10 years:

- The number of students eligible for Free and Reduced Meals has gone from 15% to 48.3%
- The number of English Learners has increased from 101 to 657
- The enrollment in our schools has decreased from 14,611 to 12,016(-2,595)
- The number of students with Autism has increased from 80 to 149
- Students with disabilities require significantly more intensive services and supports

90% of our districts improved their ELA scores. They raised them by an average of 7.3 points (range 14 - 2).

80% of our districts improved their Math scores. They raised them by an average of 4.6 points (range 9 - 1).

66% of our schools improved their ELA scores. They raised them by an average of 8.5 points (range 19 - 1).

45% of our schools improved their Math scores. They raised them by an average of 7.7 points (range 20 - 1).

#### Current Issues in Education: SB 277: Immunizations

- Senate Bill 277 went into effect July 1, 2016 and eliminated personal belief exemptions. Students must be vaccinated to attend public, charter or private school. Students must meet immunization requirements to enter kindergarten, seventh grade or enroll in a new school.
- Alternatives include medical exemptions and home school.
- Still some uncertainties in the law.
- Highly controversial particularly in Nevada County where we have one of the lowest immunization rates in the state.
- We have seen an increase in the number of children vaccinated since last year:

2014-2015 Kindergarten immunization rates: CA: 90.4%, Nevada Co: 72.6%

2015-2016 Kindergarten immunization rates: CA: 92.8%, Nevada Co: 77.1%

- Community and Agency Partnerships




