Dear Supervisors:

Please read and take into consideration my concerns as you develop cannibas regulations for unincorporated areas of Nevada County.

Licenses/permits limited to one per parcel, not per

owner/company/investor/shareholder, and not per resident. Many Single family parcels have a permitted Secondary dwelling. If the number of permitted residences is used as an allowance factor, that doubles the number of plants allowed on that parcel.

Clarify language: For cultivation for personal use, Is it 6 plants per lot/parcel or per human resident, or per permitted residence?

Need language that clearly defines human resident, and spells out the required documentation to prove residency. For example, to apply for a Real California ID or driver's license issued by California DMV, you must provide a Social Security Card and a utility-type bill in your name, at the the address that you claim as your residence.

For those lots/parcels that have a permitted residence requirement, require that the cultivator/operator Live on that parcel and be a human, (not a corporation, LLC, partnership, shareholder, etc).

Require growers/operators to post on their premises, the permit that authorizes and defines what activities/quantity is allowed on the property. This permit should be available for the public to view.

Licenses/permits limited to one per parcel, not per owner/company/investor/shareholder, and not per resident. Many Single family parcels have a permitted Secondary dwelling. If the number of permitted residences is used as a limiting factor, that doubles the number of plants allowed.
