

Tahoe Truckee Children Who Have All Vaccinations and Immunizations






Alcohol Use





Why Education Matters?

A quality education for every student is one of the best investments we can make in Tahoe-Truckee's future. Our local public school district, Tahoe Truckee Unified School District, holds a vision that all scholars are prepared for college, careers and life and provides extensive programs for preschool to college-aged students.

Overall, Tahoe Truckee elementary to college-aged student out-perform their peers across California in many areas.



Education Highlight: Closing the Achievement Gap




Education Disparity


Academic test scores of native English speakers are higher than the scores of English Learners: an occurrence referred to as "the achievement gap." While overall our students have out-performed students from other districts in California, our English Language Learners have lagged behind. As a result, closing the achievement gap for students below the proficient level in all academic areas has been the goal of the Tahoe Truckee Unified School District and the community for the past 5 years.

Although English Learner enrollment appears to change very little, in fact new "English Learners" are enrolling while others in this group are moving out due to achieving reclassification status. If English Learners meet a variety of local and state assessment proficiency levels they are considered reclassified and thus change their status from "English Learner" to "Fluent English Speaker". Consequently, the snapshot numbers stay relatively the same but the actual students are constantly changing.

Our Strategy

- In fall of 2009, TTUSD hired both a district wide English Language Learner Programs Coordinator and site specific coordinators.
- Academic intervention strategies, staff development, and increased counseling time with students and their parents are helping to narrow the gap in indicators such as third grade reading proficiency, and overall Academic Performance Index.
- Academic performance is a community concern, and multiple agencies are providing before and after school enrichment programs that have an impact.


Why Is This Important?



Reading proficiency in 3rd grade is the most important predictor of high school graduation and career success. Nationally, 2/3 of children and 80% of low-income children are not reading proficiently by the end of 3rd grade. This has significant and long-term consequences not only for each of those children but for their communities and our nation as a whole. If left unchecked, this problem will undermine efforts to end


intergenerational poverty, close the achievement gap and reduce high school dropout rates.

SNAPSHOT: Poverty Matters in the U.S.

How are we doing locally?

Based on 2013 data, **38%** of students in our local school district are not proficient readers by the end of 3rd grade. Within that, **68%** of our low-income children are not proficient by this time.

How We Impact

Tahoe Truckee Reads is a community effort to improve grade level literacy in our region. Tahoe-Truckee received the 2012 All-America City award from the National Civic League based on a plan to ensure that more children are reading at grade level by the end of 3rd grade. In conjunction with the National Campaign for Grade Level Reading, which is supported by the Annie E. Casey Foundation, Tahoe Truckee Reads works with local schools and families to increase reading proficiency in our community using **three strategies**:

- School Readiness: All kindergarten students enter school ready to learn.
- Avoiding Summer Learning Loss: Prevent the loss of academic ground during summer months.
- School Attendance: Decrease the number of K-3 grade students experiencing chronic absenteeism.

2014 Tahoe Truckee Reads Strategy Highlights:


Kinder Camp: 4-week summer kindergarten preparation camp attended by **41%** of all incoming kinders in summer 2014.

Summer Scholars: 4-week targeted intervention program for 1st through 3rd graders needing reading support over the summer months, attended by **129** students in summer 2014.

Attendance messaging focusing on the role of families in reducing absences, resulting in a district wide decline of 100 chronically absent students.


Summer Literacy Programs focusing on 6 low income neighborhoods attended by over 120 students.

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

Social Determinants of Health

Health encompasses much more than illness and medical visits. Health begins in our families, our schools, our work places, our communities and our parks. It begins in the environments in which we live, work, study and play, and these environments are largely affected by economics, social policies and politics. Otherwise known as the **social determinants of health**, these factors along with our personal behaviors, genetic backgrounds and access to care largely shape our health outcomes.

How do we compare?

Overall, Placer and Nevada County are among the healthiest of California's 58 counties in the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation's *County Health Rankings*, measuring how healthy residents are and how long they will live.

Our Challenge: Health Disparities

Tahoe Truckee residents enjoy healthy lifestyles with a strong emphasis on recreation, nutrition and healthy choices. Despite the overall healthy aspect of the region, the 2011 Tahoe Forest Hospital District Community Health Needs Assessment identified significant disparities in many health indicators between Hispanic and non-Hispanic members of the Tahoe Forest Hospital District. Overall, compared to Non Hispanic residents, Hispanic residents:

- Fared worse in overall ratings of general health
- Experienced more days with poor physical and mental health
- Were unable to see a doctor due to cost or lack of transportation at higher frequency.
- Were unable to seek dental health due to cost

SNAPSHOT: Key Findings

The 2011 Tahoe Forest Hospital District Community Needs Assessment found that Tahoe Truckee was aligned with its neighbors in Placer and Nevada counties in healthy behaviors and outcomes.

Tahoe Truckee often rated as healthier than other parts of the U.S. with some exceptions, notably alcohol and drug use.

32% of Tahoe Truckee adults report being in excellent health vs. **21%** of adults in the U.S.

15% of Tahoe Truckee adults who are **obese** vs. **27%** of adults in the U.S.

33% of Tahoe Truckee adults report drinking alcohol 3-6 times per week vs. 18% of adults in the U.S.

11% of Tahoe Truckee adults who have ever been smokers report smoking cigarettes every day vs. 30% of adults in the U.S.

Health Highlight: Immunizations

Why is this Important?

Immunizations protect a community in multiple ways, protecting immunized individuals from the disease, creating a low incidence of the target disease within the community and protecting infants and those with weak immune systems who cannot be vaccinated for medical reasons.

California law requires that children are fully immunized to enter public and private elementary and secondary schools, infant and toddler child care centers, family day care homes, and developmental centers.

Our Challenge

California is among 20 states that have allowed parents to exempt their children from immunization due to personal objections. Of note, many communities are seeing a resurgence in vaccine preventable diseases such as Pertussis and Measles. Nevada County leads the state in the number of Personal Belief Exemptions (PBE) with 21 % of students unvaccinated compared to 3 % for the state average.

Historically, Tahoe Truckee children have experienced vaccinations at a lower rate than their peers statewide. Additionally, Nevada County had a pertussis outbreak in 2013 and the highest year over year increase in the incidence of this disease per 100,000 for any California county. There was also a pertussis death in Kings Beach in 2014.

SNAPSHOT: **Immunization Matters** in the U.S.

42,000 adults and 300 children die in the U.S. each year from vaccine-preventable diseases.

For each birth cohort, routine immunizations:

Save **33,000** lives.



Our Strategy

In 2011, Tahoe Forest Health System (TFHS) convened a group of health professionals to focus on improving immunization rates within the Tahoe Truckee Unified School District through targeted parent and caregiver education and a strict school immunization adherence policy. As a result of these efforts, there has been a 32% increase in kindergartners entering school fully immunized since 2011.




Our Geography

The North Tahoe-Truckee Community is a rural high mountain community that sits at 6500 feet in the heart of the Sierra Nevada mountain range. Defined by geography, the region is separated from the rest of California by high mountain passes. Political boundaries were created to serve the water and land needs of population centers in the foothills and central valley. As a result, our community falls into three separate counties: Placer, Nevada and El Dorado. This has resulted in a confusing overlay of jurisdictional boundaries that can make it difficult for local residents to access resources. Much of the area is rural, unincorporated, and defined by a spread-out series of small neighborhoods.




Our Community


Tahoe Truckee's economy has been tourist based for over 130 years, from the early days of the transcontinental railroad to the development of a winter resort industry. Tourism brings 6 million visitors each year, causing our region of 32,000 residents to swell to hundreds of thousands of people on a busy holiday weekend.

A defining characteristic of our community is the significant disparity of wealth between our second homeowners and local working families. Approximately half of the homes in Truckee are vacation homes, with thousands of homes vacant much of the time. In contrast, low-income residents compete for a total of **403** affordable housing units (apartments or homes set aside for rent by low-income residents) in the region.

The San Francisco Bay Area salaries of our part time residents and visitors largely drive the cost of living and price of housing in the region. This makes surviving on a service sector wage extremely difficult. The restaurant workers, gardeners, housekeepers, and construction workers that keep the tourist economy going are also impacted by fluctuations in the weather, economy and seasons, again leaving workers economically unstable.

Challenges

The nonprofit sector plays a critical role in supplementing the public assistance safety net for local residents. An example of the importance of this sector can be seen in the usage of a local supplemental food program, Project MANA. In 2013, 50% of Kings Beach residents relied on Project MANA for direct food support.
