

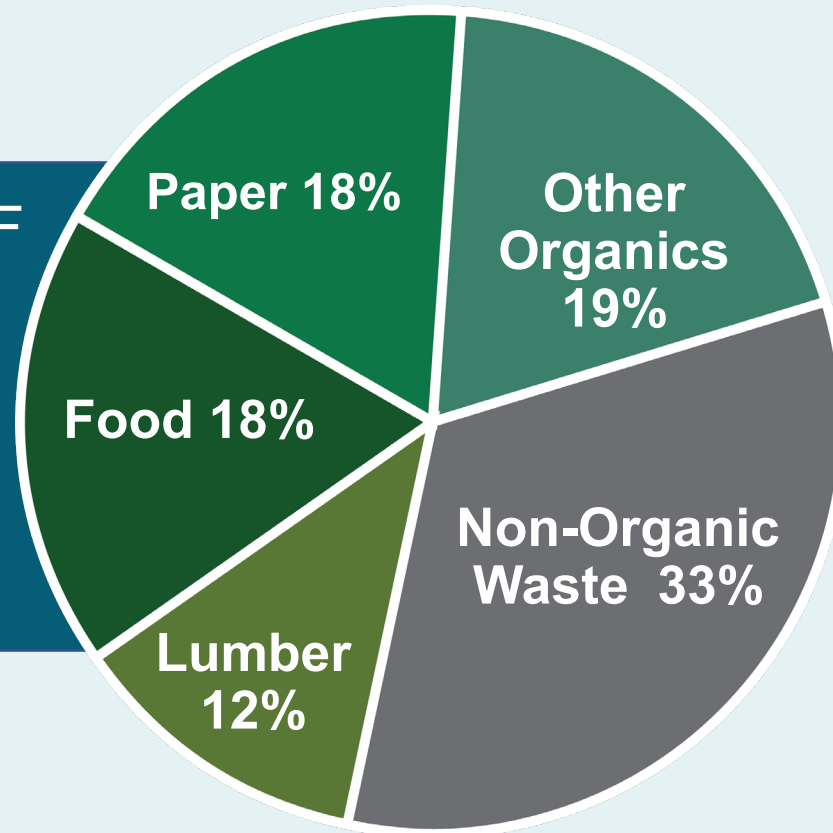

What is SB 1383?

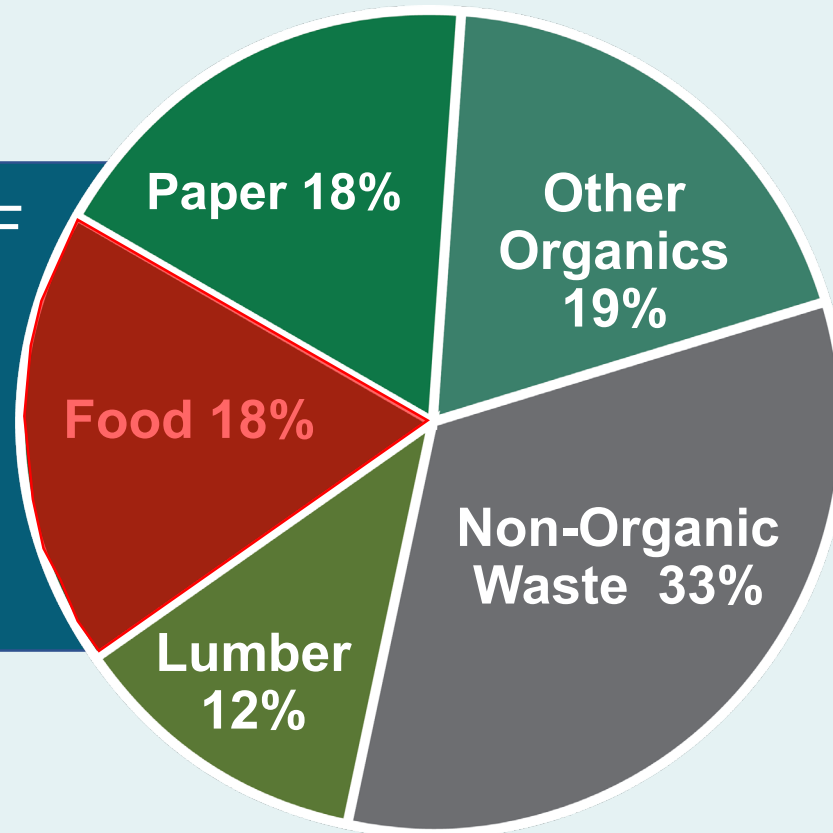

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SB1383 History

- **September 2016**, SB 1383 signed into law
- **February 2017**, Calrecycle initiated process of developing regs
- **October 2017**, Calrecycle releases first draft
- **May 2018**, Second draft released
- **January 2019**, Third draft released
- **April 2020**, Fourth draft released
- **November 2020**, Final Draft
- **January 2021**, Jurisdiction Implementation

SB1383 History

- **June 2019**, Amended WM Franchise Agreement to address SB1383
- **September 2019**, Award design contract for MRTS
- **June 2020**, Staff/Calrecycle presents to BOS
- **October 2020**, Staff/Calrecycle present to SHWC
 - Formed Organics Subcommittee
- **March 2020**, BOS Adopts MRTS Initial Study/MND
- **July 2021**, Awarded Contract and entered MOU with Grass Valley for SB1383 program development
- **December 2021**, Finalized MRTS Design

SB 1383 IN ACTION

JURISDICTION REQUIREMENTS



Provide organics collection service to all residents and businesses

Organic Waste Collection Services



Three-Container “source separated” Collection Service

- Organics prohibited from black container
- Mixed Organics (green waste and food waste) will go in the brown/grey container
- Weekly Collection/All customers
- Customers are allowed to Self-Haul or process organics on site
- All organic waste segregated
- Waivers for population density, elevation; and for areas where it is impossible or impractical to provide curbside service
- Won't begin until MRTS improvements completed
- Rates will require BOS approval

Commercial Edible Food Generators

Tier 1

January 1, 2022

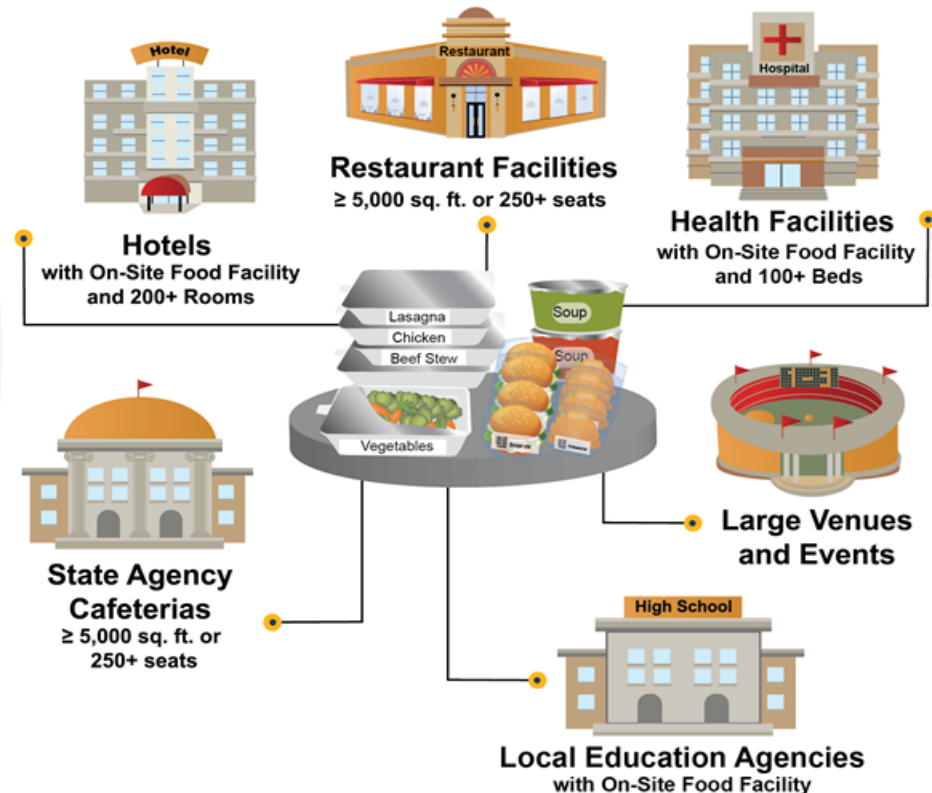
Tier one businesses typically have more produce, fresh grocery, and shelf-stable foods to donate.



Tier 2

January 1, 2024

Tier two businesses typically have more prepared foods to donate, which often require more careful handling to meet food safety requirements (e.g. time and temperature controls).

STATE ENFORCEMENT



CALRECYCLE OVERSIGHT (BEGINS IN 2022)



Authorize Waivers

- Low Population
- Rural Areas

Emergency Circumstances

Oversee and Monitor

- State Agencies and Facilities
- Local Education Agencies



Oversee and Monitor for Compliance

Jurisdiction Review

- Conduct joint inspections with jurisdictions
- Review Implementation Record



If Violations

- Issue Notices of Violation
- May Authorize Corrective Action Plan
- Allows up to 24 months to address barriers outside of a jurisdiction's control

Green Procurement and Sustainable Practices Policy

- CalRecycle provides an annual procurement target of 0.08 tons of organic waste per California resident, per jurisdiction
- The County's established goal for 2022 is 5,233 tons (14 tons/day)
 - Directly procuring recovered organic waste products from a permitted facility for use or giveaway
 - Requiring, through a written contract or agreement, that a Direct Service Provider procures recovered organic waste products
 - Paper products
- This resolution was originally Adopted in 2002, so we did make other clerical revisions

Summary

- We are in the process of improving our facility to address capacity issues
- We are in the process of developing our collection and enforcement programs
- We will be doing community outreach targeted to both residential and commercial generators
- We are working with Calrecycle to ensure the County is in compliance with SB1383
- The proposed Amendments to the Solid Waste Ordinance and Green Procurement Policies are required by SB1383 by March 1st, 2022.

Recommendation

- Adopt the updated Green Procurement and Sustainable Practices Policy
- On February 22, the BOS will hear a second reading and request for approval of the proposed ordinance amending and restating Title 2, Chapter IV, Article 8 (Solid Waste) of the Nevada County Code.
