Nevada County Historical Landmarks Commission Application for Registration of Historical Landmark

Name of proposed landmark: Grass Valley African Methodist Episcopal Church & School Site

Location: From 1854-1893 the AME Church and School (the latter then referred to as the Colored School) were located on the Eastern side of S. Church St, Lot 3, Block 45 in Grass Valley's Historic Townsite. Following the sale of the property in 1893 the lot was purchased by a private party and subdivided into four parcels. Today four c. 1894 Victorian homes occupy the site, house numbers 315, 319, 321 and 323.

City of Grass Valley Planner, Lance Lowe, notified owners of those properties of the intent of the City to consider landmarking the site. Irv and Catherine Gubman, who own the properties at 319 and 321, communicated their support of the project. The other two owners did not respond to the City's communication.

On February 23, 2021 the Grass Valley City Council voted unanimously to approve declaring the site a City of Grass Valley Landmark, and to submit an application to your Commission for county landmark status. The Council received twenty-four emails and phone calls supporting the landmark. Funds for the plaque will come primarily from the Grass Valley Historical Commission, but the Gubmans have also offered to provide funds if needed.

On the recommendation of the Grass Valley Historical Commission, the City has determined that it is not practical to install a plaque on one of those four properties. Rather, the City plans to install the plaque on the elevated sidewalk on the opposite (Western) side of the street at about 324 S. Church St. The plaque will be installed on a railing that runs along the sidewalk that is within the City's right-of-way and will be maintained by the City. The plaque will include a section of Augustus Koch's Bird's Eye map of Grass Valley (1871) that shows the full lot and both the buildings, which should allow someone reading the plaque to visualize the site as it existed in the past.

Brief history and description of proposed landmark: (attach additional sheets as necessary):

The African Methodist Episcopal (AME) Church grew out of the Free African Society (FAS), a benevolent organization founded by Richard Allen, Absalom Jones, and others in Philadelphia in 1787. The Society provided mutual aid for "free Africans and their descendants." The denomination reached the Pacific Coast in the early 1850's. In Northern California churches were established in Sacramento, Stockton, San Francisco, Marysville, Nevada City and Grass Valley.

The following description of the church is taken from *Bean's History and Directory of Nevada County, California* (1867): "The African Methodist Episcopal Church was erected in the summer of 1854, at a cost of \$1,400. The Church has been sustained by ten devoted members, with a congregation varying from twenty-five to thirty. The Church was dedicated by Rev. T. M. D. (Thomas Meyer Decauter) Ward, a colored Presiding Elder, assisted by Rev. J. B. Hill, of the Methodist Episcopal Church of Grass Valley, and also Rev. J. Or. Hale, of the Congregational Church of this place. The first clergyman who had the Church in charge was Rev. Emory Waters. The Trustees of the Church are: Isaac Sanks, Joseph Thomas, Isaac Buhner [Bulmer], John Hicks, Henry Blackburn. Rev. Peter Green, present minister in charge." On April 17, 1867 Joseph Thomas and Isaac Sanks signed, using their mark, executed a deed naming Henry Blackburn, John Hicks, and Isaac Bulmer as additional trustees for the property of the African Methodist Episcopal Church located at Lot 3, Block 45 on South Church St. in Grass Valley, CA. The deed replaced the original deed that had been lost in a fire. It was recorded on February 5, 1868.²

The AME Churches were served by pastors that traveled from one church to the other in the district, consequently services were generally held once a week. Members of the congregation often did readings or bible studies more frequently, and the Grass Valley church was known for its choir. The church was also a venue for cultural events such as events such as concerts, readings, and musical performances.

AME churches were also centers for political activities. In the 1850s a series of *Conventions for Colored Citizens of California* were routinely held at AME churches in Sacramento. The church was also used to raise funds for the important civil rights causes of the era: abolishing slavery nationwide, gaining the franchise for Black men, integrating public accommodations, and gaining the right for Blacks to testify in court cases involving whites. During the Civil War the Grass Valley church raised funds for the Sanitary Commission, a Federal organization for the medical care of Union soldiers. Following the passage of the 15th Amendment, Isaac Sanks, a former slave and founder of the Grass Valley church was likely the first Black man to run for public office in California.

The School

In 1854, Black students in San Francisco became the first children segregated in California's public schools. Soon, however, state law prohibited "Negroes, Mongolians and Indians" from attending public schools with white children anywhere in California. Andrew Moulder, an early state superintendent of schools, stated: "The great mass of our citizens will not associate in terms of equality with these inferior races, nor will they consent that their children do so." ³

The situation was similar in Nevada County. In 1859 J. Holland Townsend wrote of an incident in Grass Valley: "In Grass Valley a school was opened in the year 1854. The supervisors, after taking the census of the children, found that three of the white children had colored parents; but as these children were as white as themselves, they very wisely determined to leave them in the school." White parents protested and pressured the State Superintendent of Schools who threatened to cut off funds to the district if the children were not expelled.

In the early 1860s, California state laws authorized school districts to provide separate schools for Black, Indian, and Asian children. But a segregated school would only be established if the parents of at least 10 racial minority students petitioned a district to build one. If the parents failed to do this, their children could be denied a public education altogether. White parents tended to demand a segregated school for non-white students when their numbers increased in the community. Indeed, in 1873 Grass Valley's State Senator, Miles Poore O'Connor, was adamant about maintaining segregated schools saying: "If there was only one child of color in his district, and it must be educated, he would favor building a house and sustaining a school for it alone before admitting it to a white school." ⁵

Accordingly, Isaac Sanks of the Grass Valley AME Church took up a subscription to build a schoolhouse in 1865, which is shown on the 1871 and 1872 maps.⁶ Going forward the names of the teachers and performance of the Black school children were regularly reported in the *Union* along with students at the white schools.

Eventually the expense of a separate education system for a relatively small number of Black children in California caused the state legislature finally to abolish "colored schools" in 1880.⁷

Closure of the AME Church & School

Toward the end of the 19th century the Black population of Grass Valley had dwindled as the original pioneers passed away or joined adult children who had moved to other parts of the state. And integration of the public schools in 1880 had made the need for a separate school unnecessary. On November 2, 1893, the church was sold at public auction to Charles Clinch for \$1130. The signing trustees at the time were Elijah Booth and Isaac Sanks. The deed was recorded on November 25, 1893. The funds from the sale were returned to the AME Church.

Shortly thereafter, Charles Clinch and his wife Emily began selling off portions of the property: to C.J. and Mary Miller on March 5, 1894; to William Aver on March 10, 1894; to Thomas Ingram on April 12, 1894; and to William and Ann Edwards on October 29, 1894. Today Lot 3, Block 45 is comprised of 315, 319, 321 and 323 S. Church St. House numbering is not consecutive.

Unique aspects or properties of proposed landmark: The AME church and school were the Black community's oldest and most important institutions in Grass Valley. They provided a religious, social and political home for Black residents during one of the most turbulent periods of American history. The AME Church and School site would be the first Black institution to be landmarked in the Grass Valley.

How will the landmark be protected and maintained? The City of Grass Valley will maintain the landmark.












Nevada County Parcel Report





J. BRIEF REPORTS BY COUNCIL MEMBERS

Councilmember Hodge expressed excitement about free music program via the Center for the Arts & Music in the Mountains partnership. Councilmember Branstrom discussed continued training with League of California Cities and his ethics and sexual harassment training. He also mentioned the BYLT agreement with the City and mentioned his volunteering to help install foot trail addition to the Wolf Creek Trail.

Mayor Aguilar interrupted to introduce public comments. Tristan played voicemail from Matthew Coulter and he brought up the transient issue in the City, mentioned that the Brunswick Basin situation is out of control. He hopes that the community as a whole can work together to get ahold of this issue...he mentioned the millions of dollars that are being disbursed to the County from the State to remedy the homeless issue and he believes that nothing is happening. Patty Galle comment was also read (attached in public comments below).

Vice Mayor Arbuckle brought up her first meeting with Racial Equity Task Force Commission and REAL as a part of the League of CA Cities/. She is encouraged by the 'makeup' of the commissions...she hopes we will be able to implement, in Nevada County – not just Grass Valley, the positive movements being discussed in her meetings with the League. Mayor Aguilar said he met with Dan Miller, from the Board of Supervisors, he will be attending Board of Supervisor's meeting and LAFCO meeting. Mentioned beautiful weather and encouraged everyone to be 'as good as we can be.'





RE: Comments regarding Reopening the Idaho-Maryland Mine

This statement is submitted on behalf of Earth Justice Ministries, a locally-based interfaith nonprofit dedicated to the work of peace, justice, and the restoration of the community of life. Our work is primarily local, but we think globally and address today's interrelated issues from a spiritual perspective. We have two primary concerns that we would like you to address regarding the proposal to reopen the Idaho-Maryland Mine.

First, our concerns are not only about the many isolated problems that will arise if the mine is reopened, but about the cumulative impacts that these problems will cause. The list of concerns that people have voiced are all interrelated. Ancient wisdom and scientific evidence affirm that humans are part of the interdependent community of life. Reopening the mine would negatively impact the quality of air, water, soil, and the health of plants and wildlife in our area, but a degraded bioregion would also impact human health. The tremendous increase in energy required would result in a much greater regional carbon footprint, which means that reopening the mine would accelerate climate change, which disproportionately harms those who are most vulnerable and would create immense hardship for future generations. Many people and organizations in our community are working hard to preserve the gifts of creation in this place and to transition to a world of climate justice. The cumulative impacts of noise from drilling and heavy machinery running night and day, damage to roads caused by trucks carrying tons of toxic tailing (even through town), the release of asbestos from tons of rock being crushed every day, wells running dry because of the massive dewatering operations, it is important to look at all these problems as pointing to a project that will not help, but will harm individuals who live near the mine, our dear Nevada County community, and the interrelated community of life of which we are a part. Even the issue of aesthetics should be seen in this larger context of overall quality of life, as many people find spiritual comfort in the beauty of this place, even while it nurtures biodiversity.

The gold extracted from this mine will not stay here but will be exported to Canada. The jobs will be temporary, with many suitable only for people from outside the area. The impacts will be with us for generations, as we know from the lasting impacts of legacy mining. To us, this is a spiritual and moral issue. Temporary jobs and corporate profits should not supersede the well-being of individuals, communities, the larger world, or future generations.

My name is Luke Richter. I live in District 1. I am a small agriculture business owner and oppose the reopening of the Idaho-Maryland Mine.

Historically, mining has been destructive at multiple levels:

- Federal The 1976 Federal Land Policy Management Act (FLPMA) halted and restricted unnecessary or undue degradation of lands.
- State California's First Environmental Law was a result of Marysville destruction due to mining.
- County The Lava Cap Mine Now a Superfund Site due to high levels of toxicity from mining with currently no remediation plans

Historically, mining has negatively impacted the water supply:

Hello PGE wildfire safety council.

Morgan Ranch community is located in the district boundaries of the city of Grass Valley. We are a community of several hundred homes. All our gas and power lines are all underground. We have zero overhead PGE ELECTRICAL power lines overhead in our community.

Down the street is a retirement community called Eskaton. There are also several hundred retirees living there. All electric and gas lines are also underground.

I have lived in Morgan Ranch for 9 years now. We were sold this home being told by our realtor and real estate broker, who is on the board of realtors, that Morgan Ranch is on the hospital grid and our power would never go out!

In the last 3 years now, Morgan Ranch community has had its power shut off on numerous occasions during the PGE psps.

For some reason, all our homes now get their power shut off, even though we are supposed to be on a grid that stays running. Yet when there is a fire less than 2 miles away (Jonesbar fire) our power stayed on? There is no rhyme or reason as to why our power is shut off for safety when we have underground power lines in our community.

Lastly, every year when the PGE psps shutoff happens here, our 4 way stop light at Morgan Ranch Drive and Ridge Road crossing is completely down and not functioning during the PSPS.

I have called this in several times to the city of Grass Valley and nothing was done to warn drivers of the stop lights being out. No signs put out or anything. So when drivers in all directions drive through the 4 way stop, many out of town drivers drive straight through the intersection not noticing lights are out! We have been in near miss accidents twice now because of the traffic signals being out during psps.

Dear City Council Members:

I am opposed to reopening the Idaho Maryland mine for a number of reasons. The potential risks to our wells, our air, traffic, our peace and quiet and the like, are known. The mitigation of those risks is, according to the applicants, also known. That is a discussion for another time.

What has not been addressed is the character of the community in which we live. Grass Valley is a small, vibrant community set in the midst of woodlands and meadows, and we share this setting with the other residents who were here before men arrived, the woodland creatures. On our property, close to the Brunswick site, we have resident deer. Flocks of woodpeckers patrol the forest. There are foxes, and we hear coyotes yipping at night. There is a neighborhood bear who frequently upends garbage cans indiscreetly put out too early. This, as much as the fact of a Grass Valley address gives our home the depth of character that it has.

If the mine is re-opened, the noise and vibration, even if kept within legally prescribed limits, will drive away these creatures who give our homes the full, rich character that they now have and the neighborhood will become more like an elaborate movie set; all of the visuals, but none of the depth.

When we bought this property, we were fully aware that it was next to a former mine, but that property was zoned Light Industrial, and mining is not permitted on property thus zoned. In order to reopen the mine, the Brunswick site will need to be re-zoned to permit mining. To do so will effectively rezone the entire, fully built up residential neighborhood surrounding the Brunswick site, no matter what the map designation is; the entire character of the neighborhood will be changed by the mine.

This rezoning will also adversely affect our property values, a result that cannot be mitigated.

No benefit has been described that could not be met by another employer of similar size, since the only benefit is the payroll. This project will last for 80 years. No one alive today except small children will live to see the results of the decision that will set Grass Valley on an unstoppable path toward an end that cannot be foreseen. I ask the Grass Valley City Council to join me in opposing this unnecessary project.
