SUBJECT: Acceptance of approximately \$11,750 donation from the Estate of Albert F. Leuteneker to the County of Nevada for its spaying and neutering program

RECOMMENDATION: Adopt resolution

FUNDING: Not applicable. Donation from the Estate of Albert F. Leuteneker

BACKGROUND: The Order for Distribution for the Estate of Albert F. Leuteneker ("Leuteneker Estate") was executed on March 28, 2014, directing a distribution of 25% of the Leuteneker Estate to the County of Nevada for its spaying and neutering program. Nevada County and Nevada County Animal Control ("Animal Control"), agree to apply such funds exclusively for spaying and neutering of animals in Nevada County. The Leuteneker Estate has a value (after payment of costs) of approximately 42,000 Euros (approximately \$47,000).

This resolution will authorize the acceptance of the funds from the Leuteneker Estate. Animal Control will return to the Board of Supervisors prior to any fund disbursements with a program plan, budget and procedure for use of the funds. Animal Control welcomes suggestions for the program plan from the Board of Supervisors.

We wish to thank the relatives of Albert F. Leuteneker for his generous donation. Here is a brief eulogy prepared by Albert Leuteneker's grandson Tom Leuteneker:

"Albert Leuteneker, my grandfather, left Germany in 1911 and came into the United States through Ellis Island with his wife Pauline and daughter Lena. They settled in Chicago Park California in about 1912. He lived in his home in Chicago Park until he died in January 1955. Albert and Pauline had three sons after they came to Chicago Park, Carl, Thomas and Paul. Albert was a fruit farmer; growing mostly pear trees, with some apple and peach trees. Albert was a hard working farmer, a family man, a successful fruit farmer, and an asset to his community."
