



# RESOLUTION No. 20-284

## OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF NEVADA

### RESOLUTION ADOPTING THE COUNTY OF NEVADA 2020 LEGISLATIVE PLATFORM

WHEREAS, the Nevada County Board of Supervisors met in January 2020 during their Board Workshop and developed the 2020 Legislative Priorities for Nevada County; and

WHEREAS, the County of Nevada has had opportunity to review developing legislation and collaborate with regional, state and national associations to identify major legislative priorities, actions and positions; and

WHEREAS, County Elected Officials and Senior Executives identified legislative positions and funding requests to ensure County financial stability and delivery of core services; and

WHEREAS, County Elected Officials and Senior Executives identified legislative positions and funding requests to support and promote the 2020 Legislative Priorities; and

WHEREAS, the 2020 Legislative Platform incorporates legislative positions and funding requests to help guide advocacy efforts and provide the County increased flexibility to quickly respond and proactively advocate for positions that promote the County's priorities and to address fiscal, programmatic or unfunded mandated threats to the County's core services and values.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED that the Nevada County Board of Supervisors adopts the attached 2020 Legislative Platform for guidance and use by all County staff and departments and legislative advocacy activity.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the County Executive Officer is directed to use the Legislative Platform for the implementation of the 2020/2021 Fiscal Year Budget, the management of County operations, programs and services, the promotion of the 2020 Board Priorities; and to quickly respond and proactively advocate to address fiscal, programmatic or unfunded mandated threats to the County's core services and values.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chair of the Board of Supervisors is authorized to conduct legislative advocacy, including signing and submitting Letters of Advocacy, on behalf of the Board of Supervisors in accordance with the 2020 Legislative Platform that includes the following:

1. For Letters of Advocacy on behalf of the Board of Supervisors, the County Executive Officer shall determine and provide recommendations to the Chair of the Board on positions captured in the 2020 Legislative Platform for the Chair's consideration, approval and signature.
2. The Vice Chair shall be provided notice on advocacy recommendations.
3. All Board members shall be copied on all approved and submitted Letters of Advocacy.
4. Any Letter of Advocacy regarding an issue that is not captured in the 2020 Legislative Platform must be approved by the Board of Supervisors.

## Introduction

The Nevada County Board of Supervisors, County Executive Office, and senior executives develop this Legislative Platform on an annual basis in order to prioritize and draw attention to legislative areas of interest to the County as a whole, as well as specific program or specific legislative efforts that affect the County's ability to deliver the best possible services to our residents.

The County Executive Office leads the effort to identify and assess the priorities, funding requests and initiatives described here by engaging the senior executive team, our contracted and organization-based legislative advocates, as well as the Board of Supervisors at their annual workshop, where the Board of Supervisors sets the Board Objectives for each year. Input is also solicited from the appointed and elected department heads regarding program specific issues as well as alignment with County planning documents such as the Capitol Facilities Plan, Health and Human Services Strategic Plan, etc.

This document is shared with our contracted legislative advocacy firm, Shaw Yoder Antwih Schmelzer & Lange, Inc. as well as the public on the County's website. It is used throughout the year by the Board of Supervisors, County Executive Office and Department Heads to assess legislative issues as they arise and determine if advocacy on a particular issue is in alignment with the County's Legislative Platform.



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## 2020 Board Objectives



Maintain the County's financial stability and core services.



Reduce the loss of life during a wildfire by improving evacuation routes and early warning systems; creating more defensible space around private properties and driveways, building a network of maintained fuel breaks, engaging residents in emergency preparedness and fire-safe stewardship, and enhancing critical infrastructure.



Provide community leadership to prepare for and minimize the impacts of Public Safety Power Shutoff (PSPS) events on residents and local businesses by providing timely and accurate public information, prioritizing and advocating for the hardening of critical public safety and telecommunications infrastructure, and assisting people with disabilities and older adults.



Proactively support job-enhancing economic development by implementing business friendly data-driven policies, investing in broadband and infrastructure projects that enhance the quality of life for all Nevada County residents, and partner with private sector, non-profit, Grass Valley, Nevada City and Truckee leaders to collaboratively support local businesses and promote tourism.



Coordinate with local jurisdictions, developers and other partners to facilitate development of and access to affordable and workforce housing development.



Maintain and continue to improve the cannabis permitting and enforcement program to promote permitted cannabis activities while investigating options for additional supply chain license types and a compassionate use program.



In partnership with community providers and other jurisdictions, utilize housing first and continue efforts to prevent homelessness, provide emergency shelter, expand supportive services, secure housing, and enhance coordination to address the needs of the homeless population and to mitigate impacts on the community.



Promote community resiliency by implementing policies, cost-saving programs and best practices supported by the County's Energy Action Plan.

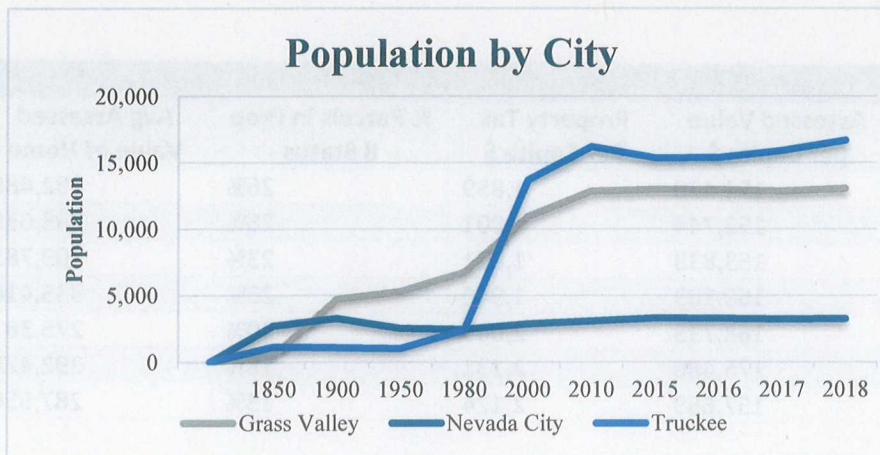
## Community Description

Nevada County is a small rural county in Northern California. The County spans 958 square miles from the Sacramento Valley to the Sierra Mountains and borders the state of Nevada, near Reno. Nevada County is home to approximately 100,000 residents with three incorporated cities which include Grass Valley, Nevada City and the Town of Truckee. Generally, Nevada County residents are older, racially similar yet politically diverse, and well-educated. Nevada County's rich gold rush history, active arts and culture scene, and access to recreational activities attract tourists, retirees, and new residents to the area.

Citizen priorities per the 2017 National Citizen Survey data:



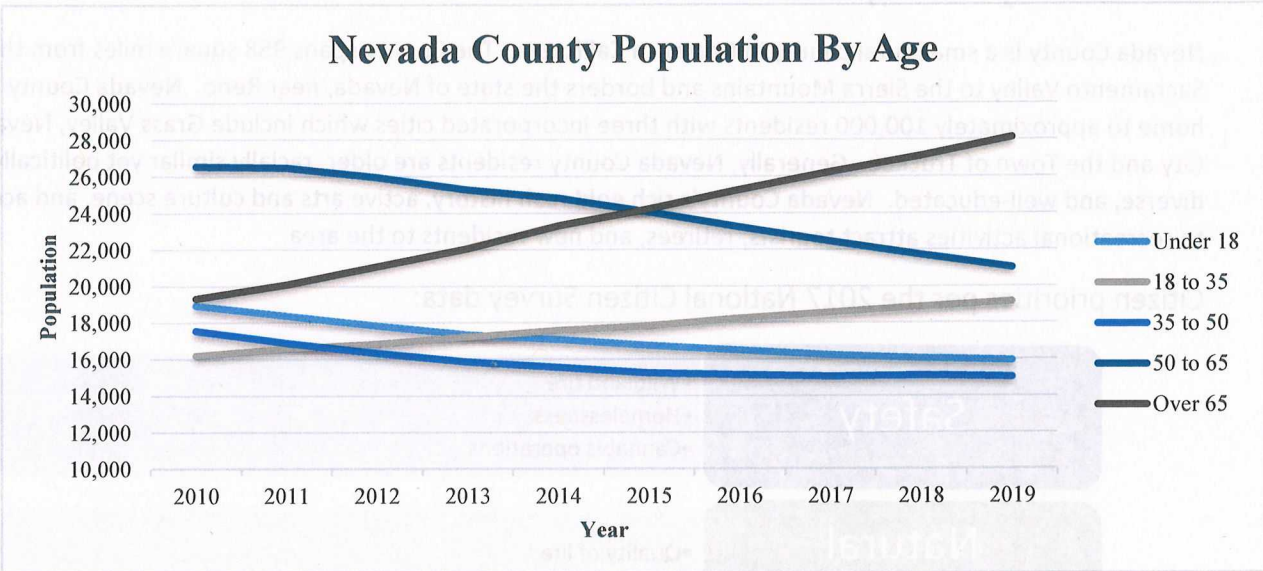
Nevada County is the 36th most populous county in California. The population grew from 92,053 in 2000 to 98,764 in 2010, and is estimated at 99,696 in 2018. Nevada County saw its highest growth between the 1950s and 1990s. The 2019 preliminary data indicates that the population will remain stable. In the last 18 years, the unincorporated portions of the County have seen the largest growth. The incorporated areas of the County are



home to 33% of the population, with 17% in Truckee, 13% in Grass Valley, and 3% in Nevada City, while 68% live in outlying unincorporated areas.

Compared to its surrounding counties, Nevada County has the highest percentage of residents over 65 years of age. There are fewer residents under the age of 30 in Nevada County (29%) than statewide (41%). With the recent

improvement in the County's unemployment and economic status, the attractiveness of this area as a great place for young families continues to increase.



Nevada County is a small, rural population and sits well below the overall California population density of 251 people per square mile. The assessed value of Nevada County real estate increased from \$4.2 billion in 1997 to a high of \$16.6 billion in 2016. Both assessed value per capita and average home value have increased since the last recession, reflecting the rebound in the real estate market. State law allows for temporary property tax reductions (Prop 8) when values decline, these reductions spiked to a peak of 31% of all properties in the County in 2010. An estimated 60% of all housing is in the unincorporated area of the County. According to Counting California Report (2000), 14% of housing units in Nevada County were second homes at that time, which continues to contribute to a lack of housing availability today. Second home ownership is especially prevalent in Truckee, a popular resort community in the Tahoe region. Total housing units is the number of single- and multiple-family dwellings, mobile homes, and other dwelling units situated within a given jurisdiction. The total number of housing units in Nevada County was 53,393 units in 2017, with a median sales price of \$391,750 placing Nevada County in the higher value range among comparison counties.

Employment by sector paints a picture of economic health by industry in the County overall. The Service-Providing sector leads in the number of people employed (64.8%), followed by Government (20.7%), and Goods Producing (13.2%) sectors. Average weekly wages range from \$473 in Leisure and Hospitality to \$1,488 in Federal Government. This year, the number of jobs in the County increased from 31,380 to 32,840. However, with outbreak of the coronavirus, unemployment has dramatically risen across state and local levels. As of the date of this writing, estimates show approximately unemployment rates could be 15.5 percent across the state.

Nevada County's vibrant community, abundant natural beauty, location and natural resources provide a competitive advantage for employee attraction. Nevada County's top businesses include technology, ski-resort and other lodgings, grocery stores, schools, and other service providers.

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
