Brief history and description of proposed landmark

305 Broad St. in Nevada City is believed to be the site of the first commercial winery in Nevada County. The building is owned by the Celio family and now houses Novak's Menswear store.

Historically significant aspects or properties of proposed landmark

In the 1850s, over 100,000 grapevines were planted in Nevada County, often by French settlers on the western part of the San Juan Ridge. For some years, Augustine Isoard operated a wine and liquor store at what is now 305 Broad Street. On June 1, 1860, he advertised in the Nevada Journal that "I have on hand a few gallons of Wine manufactured from the Grape by myself, in this city." This is believed to be the first commercial winery operation in Nevada County.

That advertisement ran for quite awhile. He was successful enough that on October 12, 1862, the Morning Transcript reported that "Mons. Isoard, on Broad street, has a wine press put up in his establishment, and is extracting the juice of the grape with it at a great rate. Isoard knows exactly how to do it, having been raised under the shade of the vine *in la belle France*." The next year, the Transcript reported that Isoard "has a large lot of superior California wine, which was manufactured by himself last season, and which he offers in lots to suit purchasers. Judges of wine who have tested Mr. Isoard's manufacture, pronounce it superior to any imported article brought to this market."

The wine industry continued to thrive in Nevada County. Thompson & West state that 50,000 gallons of wine were made in Nevada County in 1870. Around 1880, the original Nevada City Winery was established.

After a lull in the middle of the 20th century, commercial grape growing and winemaking came roaring back. Nevada County became part of the Sierra Foothills American Viticultural Area in 1987 and home to many wineries and hundreds of acres of grapes.

While grape growing and wine making are integral to modern Nevada County, this would be the first landmark commemorating this important industry.

How will the landmark be protected and maintained?

The building's owners and occupants will look after it.
